Entries Accepted:

ONLINE ENTRY IS REQUIRED and closes online on August 8th, <u>2025</u>. To enter online, go to: clackamascountyfair.com Follow the links to creative exhibits. If you experience difficulties in completing the online entry process, please reach out to the department superintendent for assistance or colleenrobertcompton@gmail.com for assistance. Since entries have to be made in advance of the fair, please enter every class in which you think you will have an exhibit – we can scratch or transfer entries based on the exhibits you actually enter.

2. Entered items will be accepted from 11:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Monday, August 11th. Entries <u>WILL NOT</u> be accepted after 8:00 p.m. NO EXCEPTIONS!!

Exhibitors with more than 20 entries are requested to be on site and in the department a minimum of 1 hour before exhibit intake cutoff so that you can complete the intake process by 8:00 p.m. – NO EXCEPTIONS.

Specific Rules:

- 1. Ag entries are limited to: 1 entry per person, per class.
- 2. Entries are limited to Oregon grown products and must be grown by the exhibitor.
- 3. Products must be grown this year unless otherwise mentioned. Grains, nuts, and grasses that do not mature before fair may be products of last year and must be so marked.
- 4. Department closed during judging and will not be open to the public until noon, Tuesday, the opening day of the Fair.
- 5. Varieties not listed may be exhibited but not entered for premiums.
- 6. No item may be entered for more than one premium.
- 7. To be a successful exhibitor, you are urged to make every effort to have mature fruits and vegetables of excellent quality that are thoroughly clean. If you have further questions about preparing your vegetables for showing, contact the Clackamas County Extension Office.

- 8. All divisions and classes are judged on the American System. Only one (1) 1st, 2nd, 3rd will be awarded per class.
- 9. In determining special awards for most points earned, the following applies: blue 5 points, red 3 points, white 1 point. In the case of a tie, the winner with the most blue ribbons shall be the winner.
- 10. No premium will be awarded just because there are no other entries in the class. If the article is not deemed worthy of a 1st place ribbon, it may be awarded a lesser premium.
- 11. In the case of Overall Division winners, King/Queen, etc., the winner must be a Clackamas County Resident, and an exhibitor cannot win the same award more than 2 consecutive years.
- 12. Submission of entry implies exhibitor's acceptance of the rules.

****Junior Exhibitors****

- 1. Exhibitors 15 years old and younger can exhibit as a Junior Gardener.
- 2. Juniors are welcome to compete in any category but may not compete in similar classes in both Junior and Adult Classes.

Release Time:

1. Entries may be picked up from 12 p.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday, **the day following the Fair**. Cash premiums will be given out at the fair office. All premiums must be claimed by August 31st.

Handy Hints & Tidbits:

Put apples in with tomatoes or winter pears to hasten ripening. NEVER ship apples and holly in the same container or the holly will defoliate before it arrives at its destination.
